Over the Hills and Far Away (Thoughts about Scotland #9) Mairi Chisholm—A Remarkable Scot

Trevor Royle's book "The Flowers of the Forest" is a recent study of the Scots, and Scotland, in the First World War. Highly researched and thorough it contains some fascinating information, not the least of which is an intriguing reference to a remarkable woman called Mairi Chisholm.

Mairi Chisholm was eighteen when the war started. One of the few people in Britain with a motor cycle, she quickly drove down to London and joined the Women's Emergency Corps as a dispatch rider. (The WAC was almost exclusively populated by suffragettes who had suspended their political activities in order to join the war effort.)

Mairi was soon recruited to Dr. Hector Munro's fledgling Flying Ambulance Corps, and she left for Belgium just as the German Army was threatening to overrun the whole country. Realising that they would save more lives if they were as close as possible to the fighting, she and her colleague Elsie Knocker established an advanced dressing station right at the front lines in a village called Pervyse. Mairi put it succinctly in an interview years later "We filled our knapsacks and things with such as we required... and walked up with the soldiers... we must have marched about ten kilometres up into the trenches in the pitch dark... and we installed ourselves up there in the cellar of a house."

According to papers in the Imperial War Museum, Mairi and Elsie were the only women to be granted full access to the front lines—a dispensation that King Albert of the Belgians himself ensured. They ran the advanced medical station for four years until British troops arrived in 1917 to reinforce this Belgian sector of the lines. During this time the two women were caught in artillery fire, bayonet charges, and in gas attacks. Both of them were decorated for their bravery and resourcefulness. Because of this, and the spiritual solace they brought to the wounded soldiers, they were known to the Belgians as the 'Madonnas of Pervyse'. **Michael Elcock**
