Over the Hills and Far Away (Thoughts about Scotland #8)

Òran Mór—Glasgow

Stepping out in Glasgow recently with one of Scotland's finest poets and playwrights, Liz Lochhead, I was treated to a lunchtime ritual at a unique arts centre called Òran Mór—formerly Kelvinside Parish Church. For \$20 there you get a pie, a pint (or a glass of wine) and a play. The play I saw was "Raspberry" by Gary Robson, and it was performed by handicapped actors and musicians.

The centre was packed, and the play was remarkable; earthy, roll-up-your-sleeves stuff—theatre in the half-round, with great production values, and in-your-face, but un-oppressive, performances. The music by Gordon Dougall was original and lyrical, and Claire Cunningham's dance-with-crutches near the end was one of the most poignantly beautiful pieces I've seen, anywhere.

Being with Liz, I was allowed into the magnificent upstairs auditorium to see Alasdair Gray's fantastic ceiling-in-progress. Gray is regarded by many as Scotland's greatest 20th century novelist. A graduate of Glasgow's College of Art, he is also a well-recognised artist. The scope and the scale of the mural he is painting on the ceiling is enormous. The vividness of its colours and concepts are breathtaking, and the subtle light from the great stained glass window at its north side gives it an intense, ethereal air.

Òran Mór is a treasure. It works in Glasgow because it taps into the essence and the character of the city. It's very different from anything you've seen on this side of the Pond, and more than worth a visit if you're over there.
