In the basic class you will learn the five basic steps of Scottish Country Dancing and the various formations that make up the dances. You will become familiar with the concept of sets, progressions, technique and teamwork and you will experience the joy of moving to the lively music in a relaxed social setting. By the end of the year you will be able to dance many basic dances with some degree of confidence.

If you want a class with variety, this is it! Dancers are welcome to attend all or some of the classes.

The two Wednesdays before the Socials will be Social Program Review - shared by all Teachers (October 8, 15; November 5, 12; December 10) -7:30 - 9:30 pm.

Other Wednesdays will be a class for Demonstration and Performance Dancing (September 24; October 1, 22; November 19, 26) taught by Joan Axford.

This class will provide instruction for two teams of dancers. Celebrating the 20 year anniversary of the Commonwealth games in Victoria

The VISCDS was very proud to have been asked by the Producer/Director Jacques Lemay, to perform in the Opening Ceremonies of the 1994 Commonwealth Games. Of course, we said yes but little did we know what we were getting into. Practices started in January for a performance on August 18, 1994. We found out that all the ethnic dance groups would be doing a common piece and then our own choreography to common music. The other challenge was that the music was being written specially for the event and we practiced for the first four months to just the beat of the music called the click clack tape. When the music finally arrived we held our breath that our Scottish country dance routine would work and miraculously it did!! What fun to dance Scottish country dancing to the same music as the Hungarians, Ukrainians, Norwegians, Highland, etc. danced their forms of dance.

We danced on with the Indian ladies and their saris were beautiful against our tartans and white dresses.

As you all know, the Queen attended the event and is the patron of the RSCDS. Jacques knew this and positioned our group directly in front of her so she would see us dance. When the dancing started she was looking away from us but Prince Philip nudged her and pointed us out and she immediately turned to watch and smiled throughout our performance.

With an estimated audience of 500 million, there were TV cameras everywhere and one ambitious camera crew decided to film in the middle of our set which was a challenge but we did make the broadcast up close.

In Memoriam – John Drewry

Dancers from all over the world were saddened to learn of the recent passing of John Drewry, dance devisor extraordinaire. Some of his dances that we enjoy include "The Bees of Maggieknockater", "The Blooms of Bon Accord" and "Autumn in Appin".

John was born in Melton Mowbray, home of the famous pies, in 1923, the year that the Scottish Country Dance Society, later 'Royal', was formed. He started Scottish Country Dancing in Cumbria as part of a ramblers group. Hugh Foss, another well-known dance devisor, encouraged him to begin to create dances.

John was appointed to the biochemistry department of the University of Aberdeen in the 1960's, and he remained in that city for the rest of his life (hence the "Bon Accord" in the titles of several of his dances). The Royal Scottish Country Dance Society (RSCDS) published several of his dances, and Roy Goldring, author of many popular social dances, devised "John of Bon Accord", which is inscribed to John, and which appears in the RSCDS Book 33.

John taught at a Van Isle workshop in the late 1980's and he devised "Victorian Strathspey" in our honour. He also taught at our workshop in 2004, and he devised "Victoria Plums" for us. He brought us a new book of then-unpublished dances, including "Dancing in the Right Circles", which has since been published in *The Stoneywood Collection Vol 2*.

We are all indebted to John for his legacy of many wonderful dances.

As the founding teacher, Fiona has taught the social class, seniors, children, technique and at the demonstration group for the Lethbridge Scottish Country Dance Club. Fiona has also taught at the TAC Summer School, week-long summer camps and weekend workshops throughout North America. Fiona has tutored and mentored candidates to take their RSCDS Teachers' Certification. In her other life Fiona has just retired from teaching "English as a Second Language" (ESL) to Middle School-aged refugee children. It is Fiona's philosophy that everyone should have fun dancing, while learning a little bit about Scottish Culture. With Mary Ross providing the music for the workshops, this is an event not to be missed.

The Tartan Players, who we so much enjoyed dancing to last year, have agreed to once again be our evening dance band. The **Tartan Players**, formed in 2005, is a Scottish Dance Band which has rapidly become a sought after group, with their lively playing and signature sound. **Julie Smith** (piano/bandleader) teaches music in public schools, directs choirs and plays for Scottish Country Dance ("Music is my life"). She has attended Master Workshops in Scottish Country Dance music. **Deborah Jones** (fiddle) has more than thirty years' experience of Scandinavian folk fiddling and has played in the Vancouver Fiddle Orchestra since 1990. **Carole Berger** (flute/whistle) has augmented her BMus with the study of Traditional music at workshops in Boston, Goderich and Vancouver. She has played for Scottish and Irish dancing for over ten years. **Lukasz Wieczorek** (fiddle) has played in the West Coast Fiddlers for almost ten years.

Dance information – here is some information on a few dances on upcoming programs. The information is from various websites.

Culla Bay – a bay on the Isle of Benbecula, Outer Hebrides, very scenic. The dance was devised by Ann Dix

Rothesay – a town on the Isle of Bute, southwestern Scotland. It lies along the coast of the Firth of Clyde. A major attraction is the ruined Rothesay Castle. The dance, "Rothesay Rant", was devised by Anna Holden.

MacDonald of the Isles – or Lord of the Isles, historical roots go back beyond the Kingdom of Scotland, to the Norse/Viking days. At their height, the island chiefs were the greatest landowners and most powerful Lords in Britain; their territories included the Hebrides and parts of the Scottish mainland. Nowadays, the Title belongs to the ruling British monarch. HRH Prince Charles is styled Lord of the Isles. For further information, see Wikipedia's fascinating article, "Lord of the Isles". The dance was devised by Derek Haynes.

Auchterarder – a town in Perthshire. The famous bandleader, Ian Powrie, owned a hobby farm in the area. When he emigrated to Australia, Bill Hamilton devised the popular dance "Ian Powrie's Farewell to Auchterarder" in his honour.
