A **Burns supper** is a celebration of the life and poetry of the poet Robert Burns. The suppers are normally held on or near the poet's birthday, January 25.

The first suppers were held *in memoriam* in Ayrshire at the end of the 18th century by Robert Burns' friends on July 21, the anniversary of his death, and they have been a regular event ever since. The first Burns club was founded in Greenock in 1801 by merchants born in Ayrshire, some of whom had known Burns. They held the first Burns supper on what they thought was his birthday, January 29, 1802, but in 1803 they discovered in Ayr parish records that his date of birth was January 25, 1759. Since then, the suppers have been held on January 25.

Burns suppers may be formal or informal. Both typically include the traditional haggis celebrated by Burns in his *Address to a Haggis*, Scotch whisky, and the recitation of Burns' poetry. Formal suppers follow a standard format: Host's welcoming speech; Selkirk Grace; Piping in the Haggis; "Address to a Haggis"; Supper - the menu usually includes meat of some sort (often beef), champit taatties (mashed potatoes), bashed neeps (turnip) and, of course, haggis. Supper is followed by the Toast to the Lassies; Lassie's Reply to the Toast; and "Immortal Memory". Afterwards, there may be recitations of Burns' poetry; or, as in our event, dancing.

Dance programs often reflect the purpose of the event with dances whose titles are associated with Burns' poetry. "The Silver Tassie" does the honours for our Burns social.

In Memoriam



Lucy Whitehouse

Many dancers will remember Lucy Whitehouse, who became something of a local legend during her twenty-odd years as an active member of VISCDS. Lucy died peacefully in her sleep on August 24.

Lucy began Scottish country dancing when she signed up for a class at the Y in the mid-1970s. She almost quit when told she couldn't wear the comfy Wallabies she'd used for folk dancing, but she couldn't get a refund, so she stuck with it — and was hooked on the music and dance of her ancestors. She joined VISCDS, began dancing regularly and very soon afterwards began teaching, going to a class in town one night and teaching what she'd learned to her students in Sidney the next.

Fun, music and technique were the pillars of Lucy's teaching. Everyone felt comfortable in her classes and giggling fits were not unknown. She exposed her students to recordings featuring a variety of instruments so that they developed an ear for music. She taught footwork and formations, but emphasized the social aspects — good communication; gracious hands; joyful dancing.

The dance community Lucy developed on the Saanich Peninsula became an important element of the VISCDS membership. The October Harvest Socials her group hosted were popular and memorable for the warm atmosphere, the beautiful decorations and the music — always a live band. (No one who was there will forget when the much-loved Schiehallion band retired and Lucy lined up a local dance band that hadn't a clue about the rhythm of a strathspey!)

She put effort into recruiting new dancers. Her close-knit, hardworking demonstration team entertained around the Peninsula and introduced their audiences to dancing. She began the annual Willows Beach ceilidh that drew large crowds to enjoy the music (always live), dance and performances. Such was Lucy's passion for live music that during the term she served as the society's president she emptied the treasury paying for bands — or so she claimed! (It wasn't true.)

In 1988, Lucy received a Certificate of Merit from the Governor General of Canada in recognition of the contributions she made through Scottish country dancing, and in 1995, the society honoured Lucy with life membership.

Dancing brought Lucy wonderful adventures. In Ashland, Oregon, she taught a workshop to dancers who organized themselves not as men and ladies, but right file and left file. She took her preliminary teaching certificate at St. Andrew's, then toured Scotland with her daughter Jenny. She went to China with other dancers, where they danced "Reel of the Royal Scots" on the Great Wall.

She often said that her Scottish country dance years were the best of her life. Then she quickly added, "But don't say that! It's supposed to be my family years!"

Scottish country dancing kept Lucy healthy, made her friends all over the world, helped her discover her organizational and public relations skills, and above all, filled her with joy. They were indeed the best years of her life.

Memories of Lucy Whitehouse (March 13, 1926 to August 24, 2014)

Lucy Whitehouse was a vibrant member of the VISCDS for many years. She joined in about 1975. When Lucy joined so did her whole family. Her daughters Pattie and Rosemary joined to dance and later Pattie's partner Robert Irvine. In the 1970s, we held wonderful socials at Oak Bay Seniors Centre and provided bar service. Lucy's husband Pete Whitehouse used to man the bar. Although he said it was a very quiet job, he always had good stories to tell and supported Lucy in her love of dancing. The family also supported the group by providing a place to build and store our Folkfest castle and opening their home to many picnics and meetings.

Lucy took her teacher's certificate in 1983 and taught classes in Sidney for many years. She also had a demonstration team and was very determined that they would dance well. For fun, Lucy introduced our group to English Country Dancing.

Lucy was always a good sport and willing to participate in fun activities - the teachers once did a jazz number for entertainment at a social. Lucy dressed as a flapper dancer. I was reminded recently that she also played the part of the Queen in one of our skits at the Spring Fling. On these occasions, Lucy always had a twinkle in her eye.

I appreciated Lucy on the teachers' committee as she was always thoughtful and supportive of the group and our dancing. When she was the teacher at a social, it was like we all gathered at her place and she was a marvelous hostess and made everyone feel welcome. She was missed when she retired from teaching and it is sad to know that Lucy won't be back again.

Christmas in Scotland

Nollaig Chridheil (pronounced nollik hree-el) – "Merry Christmas" in Scots Gaelic.

Christmas was celebrated in Scotland until the Protestant Reformation of the 1580's, when it was banned as being too Papist. It took over 400 years for Christmas to be made a public holiday and, even today, the celebrations are somewhat restrained, as the Church of Scotland is not very keen on the festival. However, the Scots do observe several traditions. Many are similar to our own.

As in Canada and the US, Scottish stores have their Christmas merchandise and displays out just before Halloween, and civic decorations soon follow. Councils in smaller districts encourage the shops in their areas to stay open later in competition with those in larger centres. "Santa's Grottos" appear about now; children can visit Santa and tell him what they want for Christmas. Children make their own Advent calendars which have small doors, one for each day in December up to Christmas Eve, with a small picture behind each door. The children also write letters to Santa in Lapland. One means of sending the letters is throw them in the fireplace. The lists go up the chimney and make their way to Santa. Many children hang their stockings on the end of their beds, rather than on the fireplace. Sometimes the children use pillow cases instead of stockings. Santa is supposed to come and fill the stockings or cases. Families decorate their houses and, as in North America, the decorations nowadays are getting more outrageous. Most families decorate trees and, in the 21st Century, use artificial, rather than 'live' trees.

As in many other nations, Christmas Eve is observed in Scotland. In some regions, it is called "Sowans Nicht". The name probably comes from "sowans", which is a dish made from oat husks and fine meal steeped in water and which is eaten on this day. Another popular tradition is the burning of the branches of a rowan tree. This signifies that any bad feelings between friends or relatives have been put aside for the Yuletide season. Many families light fires to prevent the elves from entering their house and causing trouble. In many areas, it is believed that if the fire goes out on Christmas Eve, the family will suffer bad luck in the coming year.

The many traditional dishes that are served during the Christmas Season include black buns, Bannock cakes and sun cakes. Also on the menu are plum pudding, clootie dumpling, mince pies, shortbread, roast duck, smoked salmon coronets with prawns, seafood bisque (served with brandy sauce), and sometimes a chocolate Yule log. On Christmas Day, many families have a soup – often cock a leekie - as a starter and, for the entrée, turkey with all the trimmings. Each family has its own favourites. Some families have their big meal at lunch; others, at supper (dinner). Most people have Christmas crackers which contain paper hats and small toys.

Families, including aunts, uncles, grandparents and cousins, get together to open their gifts. After lunch, most families watch the Queen's Speech which apparently always comes on at 3:00 pm. Often, special movies such as "The Wizard of Oz" or "The Sound of Music" are shown on TV. The children play with their new toys while the grownups either watch TV or visit with each other. Families spend the days after Christmas waiting for Hogmanay. But that's another story!
