In 1987, she was awarded the Society's Scroll of Honour, for her contributions to the various Branches.

As well as being an accomplished teacher, Mary devised many dances, including the perennial favourite, "Mamie's Jig", named for her Mother; Sandy Butterly, Fife Ness and The Double Sixsome.

Here is some information on a few of the dances that you will be doing at Bob's Summer Socials.

**Jubilee Jig** – one of three dances devised by the then-Publications Committee for the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society's (RSCDS) Golden Jubilee in 1973. The other two dances are "Miss Milligan's Strathspey", which we also do on occasion; and the reel "Mrs Stewart of Fasnacloich", which is more difficult and is rarely done here.

A **Barmkin** (obsolete term) was a defensive outer wall which surrounded a small castle or other buildings. It would have contained ancillary buildings and could be used to house cattle during a raid. Barmkins are found in the north of England and in Scotland. The dance is a reel.

**The Forth Railway Bridge Centenary Reel** was devised by Roy Goldring to celebrate the Bridge's centenary in 1990. The bridge is just outside Edinburgh and connects the villages of North Queensferry and South Queensferry. It is a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

A tour guide once told me that a bunch of Edinburgh locals had some overseas visitors convinced that the train goes up and down the bridge's humps, rather than through the middle!

**Jennifer's Jig** was devised by John Drewry and is inscribed to the pianist Jennifer Wilson of Elgin, Scotland. Jennifer has been playing for classes at St Andrews Summer School since the 1970's.

**The Dancing Master** was devised by John Drewry to mark the retirement of Bill Ireland as teacher of the London Branch Demonstration Team in 1989. It is a jig.

**From the Broomielaw** – the Broomielaw is a major thoroughfare in the City of Glasgow, running adjacent to the River Clyde on its North Bank. Named after Brumelaw Croft, it runs from Jamaica Bridge to Finnieston Quay. Glasgow's first quay was built at Brumelaw in 1688. Paddle steamers ran from here to the coast for daytrips to the seaside and for some business people to commute. The dance is a strathspey.
