The St John River, originally from “The Centennial Collection”, was the winning dance in a competition held in celebration of Canada’s Centennial in 1967. The dance describes the river as it meanders through New Brunswick, under bridges, through whirlpools, and through the reversing falls located in the City of St John, before dispersing into the ocean. The dance was devised by Prudence Edwards, and it is a strathspey.

A Trip to Applecross. Applecross is a peninsula in Wester Ross. The name is at least 1300 years old, and it is now used locally to refer to the 19th Century village that lies on Applecross Bay. Until the late 20th century, the only road to Applecross was notoriously treacherous. There is now a winding coastal road which travels around the peninsula. The old road was featured in several episodes of the television series “Hamish McBeth”. The dance is a reel.

Miss Johnstone of Ardrossan is, of course, Muriel Johnstone, distinguished pianist and musician. Ardrossan is a town on the North Ayrshire coast. Its roots can be traced back to the twelfth century. The Machine Without Horses is thought to refer to the sedan chairs used in Glasgow and Edinburgh during the 18th Century. There were stands of sedan chairs, just as there are stands of taxi cabs today. The dance is taken from a publication of the year 1772. It is a jig.

The Inimitable Derek, devised by Roy Goldring, was inscribed to Derek Haynes from the Lancaster area. He was a teacher and deviser of dances. He taught at workshops and weekend schools throughout Great Britain and beyond. Two of his dances with which we are familiar are Domino Five and Miss Gibson's Strathspey. The dance is a reel.

Black Donald is a colloquialism for the Devil in Scottish Mythology. The defining characteristic of Black Donald is his cloven feet, which betray whatever disguise he assumes. The dance is a jig.

The gentle art of encouraging new dancers

This is the time of year when we hope to see new faces at our dances and events. All of us wish to welcome them, and all of us want them to stay and become part of our dance community. But whether they stay or not depends largely on our behaviour towards them. Here are a few guidelines which may help us keep those new dancers coming back:

- Don't make a headlong rush for the head of the hall at the start of every dance! Instead, try to dance in different parts of the hall, and with different partners.
- Do invite a beginner to dance, but first make sure that the dance is within his or her capacity. Make a point of introducing yourself.
- Resist those desperate cries for "One more couple!" if they make you pressure a reluctant new dancer into joining you. A good MC will always find alternative ways of arranging the sets for most dances.
- Don't push or pull a hesitant dancer, and don't shout instructions. Instead, use subtle gestures, or give simple and quiet clues like "This way" or "Turn with me." If possible, the dancer's own partner should give the guidance; trying to listen to seven people at once can be disorienting and unpleasant.
- Don't underestimate the difficulties faced by a new dancer. A formation like "rights and lefts" which is second nature to the experienced can be confusing at first, and offers many opportunities to go astray. Terminology, steps, formations – the new dancer may be struggling to absorb all of these at once.
- When the dance ends, make a point of thanking all members of the set. Whatever their level of performance, all have contributed to your enjoyment.
- Don't blame a beginner for "spoiling" a dance for you, or show annoyance. This experience can be so traumatic that the new dancer does not return. Good humour should be part of the dancing experience from the beginning.
- Do notice when people are sitting out at a party and invite them to do the next dance with you. That's how many dancing friendships start. Your reward will come in a year or two from now, when the hesitant newcomer has become a confident, smiling, seasoned dancer ready to tackle "Polharrow Burn" with you!
