President's Report May 2018

We had a wonderful Ball on April 7th which was held at the Ambrosia Event Center on Fisgard Street. It was a very attractive Center and the appetizers served later in the evening were superb. The workshops went off very well and I heard lots of positive reports from the participants.

At the Annual General Meeting we voted in three new members of the executive for 2018 2019. Susan Langridge will take over as Treasurer from Jamie Orr who has served for the last four years. Thank you Jamie! Edith Chapman is returning to the position of Newsletter Editor and a big thanks to John Duffus who has done an excellent job editing the Fling for the last year. Also many thanks to Susannah Andersen who has been our secretary for the last two years and welcome to Betsy Lockhart who will be taking over this position.

This has been an interesting and sometimes challenging year for the teachers with quite a few changes from the past year. We had a huge influx of new dancers to the Basic class. Out of thirty-eight new members, twenty-eight joined the Basic class. The Basic class teacher Sheila McCall has done a masterful job of teaching this large group which included seventeen newcomers in January. We had anywhere from three to five sets in attendance with support from many experienced dancers. It's been a very enjoyable class with lots of enthusiasm and laughter. Having mini socials after every six classes works well and the group brought along very nice snacks for break time. This Saturday we had the Spring Fling Social hosted by the Basic class and I was pleased to see so many new dancers joining in.

The intermediate class also saw a large increase in numbers with three to four sets in attendance. This year Sarah Kell and Gordon Robinson took turns running the class and there was a lot of high energy in the room. It was a challenging class to teach however as there was a disproportionate number of more advanced dancers to the smaller number of quite new intermediate dancers We hope that some of the more experienced dancers from the Basic class will be interested in moving up to the next level and expect to reintroduce the Beyond Basic social dancing class on Thursdays.

As we no longer have access to the church hall at Obed on Wednesday nights, this year we had to move both the daytime Social and the Wednesday night class. The daytime social moved to Tuesday afternoon at Obed but also lost

some regulars who could not attend on Tuesdays. The Wednesday night class moved to a new location and also changed its format, becoming the Scottish country and step dancing class. The attendance was strong in the fall but dropped when the class relocated from the St Peter and Paul's Anglican Church in Esquimalt to the Lutheran church on Cedar Hill Cross Road. We are reviewing alternate venues for this class.

Lorraine Irvine is a long-time member of Van Isle. She is a doctor who for many years did volunteer work at various hospitals in Zimbabwe. Each year, we held a benefit dance to raise funds for Lorraine to take with her to pay school fees for the numerous orphaned children.

Dear dancing teachers and dancing friends,

Thank you to all of you who have given me so much pleasure and happiness over the years. A special thank you to Pat Blair for putting on all the Zimbabwe dances. And thank you to Bob Anderson for all the happy hours of summer dancing. I would also like to thank all those who contributed to the Zimbabwe dances and to those who donated to VIDEA. Your kindness has made a great deal of difference to many children in Zimbabwe. I have had the privilege of working in Africa for the past 30 years but my most meaningful have been the past 22 in Zimbabwe, where I have served as physician and Ambuya (Granny) to many. While at Howard hospital in Zimbabwe, I had the good fortune to work with Dr. Paul Thistle, the most dedicated young doctor that I've ever met. In all the years I have known him I've never heard him say or do an unkind thing. He works long hours and has devoted his life to helping the poor of Zimbabwe. I have also made close friendships with many other volunteers as well as many more Zimbabweans such as Julie, Lovemore and Bigboy who are like my own family. My philosophy has been "humanity is love, love is a service, and the service must meet the need". I heard a similar statement in a Scottish sermon over 50 years ago. I've tried to live by this and have I succeeded? Not always. But I will keep trying. Wishing you all good health and happiness,

The children were astonished to see their teachers perform. And in such fancy dress!

Here is some information on dances that will appear on the programs for summer dancing.

Bonnie Stronshiray – Stronshiray was part of lands in Argyll designated to a MacIver, whose son forfeited them for his part in the rebellion by Archibald, 9th Earl of Argyll. After the Revolution the lands were restored to the grandson on the condition that he and the heirs of the family of MacIver should assume the name and bear the arms of Campbell. The dance, a strathspey, was devised by Robert (Bob) Campbell, whose family came from this area. - from "Glasgow Assembly and other SCD", Robert Campbell, 1980 Ed. and from Wikipedia

James Senior of St Andrews – James Senior was the proprietor of a shoe store in St Andrews, which specialized in dance shoes suitable for both SCD and Highland dance. Over the years, he welcomed thousands of dancers from around the world and helped outfit them in dance shoes. He was a delightful gentleman. The store is still in business. The dance is a strathspey devised by Jenny Bradley.

Lochanora – or Lochan Ora, translates as "Golden Loch Liqueur". It was produced by the Chivas Brothers and was made from 100% Scotch whiskies sweetened with heather honey and herbs. Chivas Brothers discontinued production in 2010. The dance was devised by John Drewry and is a strathspey. Long-time dancers will remember King and Margaret Wardell ('King of the Bin'). The dance was a favourite of King's. - from Wikipedia

The Wapenshaw – or wapinshaw, Old English for "weapon show" was a gathering and review of troops held in every district in Scotland, in order to satisfy the military chiefs that the arms of their retainers were in good condition and that the men were properly trained in their use. The dance is a jig by John Drewry.
