## TEACHER'S NOTES -DANCING ETIQUETTE

I think it is appropriate at this time, early in the season, to define some of the characteristics of Scottish Country Dancing, and to consider how well we are achieving them. Good teamwork is essential within the set, whether dancing or waiting to dance, observing what is happening in the set, and anticipating our own part in it, so that the continuous flow of the dance is maintained. Good covering clearly shows the pattern and matching movements of the dance, while careful phrasing requires that every step must be danced with the music and distances judged by thinking ahead, to order to move smoothly from one formation to another.

Dance Etiquette is simply good manners and a natural part of the dance. At a Ball or a Social, sets are made up only after the dance is announced. Couples join the set at the end of the line. The gentleman at the top of the line counts off the required number of couples for each set, and sees that the last set in the line is complete, when ever possible. The dance starts and ends with couples acknowledging their partner with a Bow for the Man and a Curtsev by the lady, even when she is dancing on the man's side of the set. Excessive clapping and hooting during the dance is not considered appropriate. At the end of the dance it is courteous to thank the other dancers in the set for their helpful participation, and then the floor is cleared.

The appearance of Scottish Country Dancing is what sets it apart from other forms of dancing and this is achieved by the use of technique which includes accurate footwork, courteous use of hands, thoughtful stepping up and down and an awareness of other dancers. Thus a basic knowledge and understanding of technique can only enhance our enjoyment of the dance.

## A JONES BY ANY OTHER NAME WOULD SMELL AS SWEET

With a name like Jones I needed help so I went to my father who said "Young whelp, go marry a Campbell." Have you any idea how many pages of Campbell there are in the Toronto telephone directory? Well! Almost as many as Jones and all of them with phones.

My wife vetoed a double-barreled name with a hyphen.

"Campbell-Jones", she scoffed, names like that are rife in smart society.

Do you want to be thought one of the royal clones?

Give me a plain old Gallic name like Jones. "Nay Lassie" quoth I, "It's a bra bricht moonlicht nicht tonicht,

and I'll research the Campbell clans before I'm licht."

Well, strewth and dammit, it's not that easy though all, it seems, fought for king and country. Campbells of Argyle battled at Langside One for Oueen Mary and one – on the other side.

Campbell of Braedalbane, "cunning as a fox and slippery as an eel,"

Was widely regarded as a genuine Scots "heel". And Campbell of Cawdor who bought the Isle Islay

Was not the first Scottish real estate agent, but simply wished to avoid the fray.

Just as I was beginning, under pressure, to wilt, my wife scotched my search for Scots ancestors by pointing out that with legs like mine I could never wear a kilt.

So it's back to Jones, and I'll use my initials: T.S.E. Toronto Stock Exchange, and I'll try not to bristle.

#### A SPECIAL BURNS NIGHT FOR CHEMAINUS IN 2003

When Karl Shutz, first envisaged creating the murals of Chemainus he knew they would have economic spin-offs which would benefit the town. Indeed that was the point. But even he could not have dreamt that the murals would result in the visit of a Scottish Baron, the twinning of Chemainus with Prestonpans in Scotland and a Burns Night dinner and concert in Chemainus attended by Baron Prestoungrange and his wife Lady Avril.

When the Baron learned about "the Little Town That Did", which established tourist opportunities and revenue for itself by creating a series of wonderful murals depicting the town's history, he contacted Karl Shutz. Together they attempted the same magic in Scotland, this time in the Baron's town of Prestonpans.

There, to date, five new murals have been created. A wealth of older murals from the 16<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> centuries plus sculpture has been gathered together and a "Mural Trail" created. An historic old pub, the "Gothenburg" has been purchased and restored to brew the old beers and act as a heritage center. Pottery competitions are in full swing. And all this activity grew out of the Baron's visit to Chemainus.

As a thank you, the Baron is patron for a 2003 Burns Night dinner and concert in Chemainus' beautiful theatre. Many talented members of Victoria's Scottish community will enliven the dinner. The performances by the Victoria Gaelic Choir, the Lynne Griffith's Highland Dancers and the Pipes and Drums of the Canadian Scottish Regiment (Princess Mary's) will ensure that the concert is memorable. A fitting tribute to "the Little Town That Did" and its extraordinary citizens from its twinned city of Prestonpans and Baron Prestoungrange.
