Memories of Fort Worden

The first Fort Worden Weekend was held in 1974, and thanks to my teacher, Fran Clermont, who insisted that I go, I was there. I attended almost every weekend after that, up until a few years ago – about 42 weekends - before I had to call it a day. For a while, I held the record of having attended the most weekends. The format of the weekends has changed greatly over the years. June has asked me to write something about past weekends.

The Registrations and Welcome Dances were originally held in Building 225, one of the dormitories. Registration was in a downstairs room and the dances were held in one of the large upstairs rooms. They were always run by venerable teacher Noel Lillie, and we danced to recorded music. Then, for several years, the Registration and Welcome Dances were held at the USO Hall. It has been only in the last fifteen or so

years that the Welcome Dances and Balls have been held in the hall at the Jefferson Fairgrounds.

Classes were held in several of the halls scattered throughout the Fort. I remember there being around six classes. Again, we danced to recorded music. The numbers of classes were cut as registrations fell off. Somewhere along the way, we starting have 'live' music for the classes.

The Balls were originally held in the USO Hall. For the first couple of years, the hall had a rather dubious wooden floor; then 'An Officer and a Gentleman' was filmed at the Fort and the movie company redid the floor: a small parquet square surrounded by carpeting. The floor is still that way. One became adept at 'jumping' over the metal rod that separates the carpet from the parquet, while dancing! We have always had 'live' music at the Ball, and for the first ten or so years, the band was Schiehallion from Vancouver BC. Since then, we have had a succession of musicians play for us.

For a number of years, there were formal classes on Sunday morning. Nowadays, of course, there is social dancing, with all the teachers taking turns teaching, at times, some unusual dances. Music is supplied by the Weekend musicians, augmented by other musicians who are attending the weekend as dancers.

My dance, 'Fort Worden Fun', was published in the "Fort Worden XX Collection", which was published in 1994. That is about when I wrote it. The dance was designated the winner in the class for dances suitable for beginners. I chose the name because I thought that the Fort Worden weekend IS Fun! (I still do.) 'Fort Worden Fun' is on our New Year's social program.

It appears that the Fort Worden weekends are to become a thing of the past. The Seattle Branch may choose to have their weekends at some other venue. I hope they continue to be successful, but it won't be the same, and I feel saddened.

As those of you who have attended the Fort Worden weekends can see, the format of the weekends has changed a lot over the years. However, the classes have always been very informative, the dances have always been enjoyable and the music has always been fantastic – just as they are today!

The Piper and the Penguin



This popular dance with the quirky name is part of the 'Scotia Suite of Scottish Country Dances'. The dances in this Suite were devised by Roy Goldring as part of the celebrations of the centenary of the *Scotia*, the research ship of the Scottish National Antarctic Expedition of 1902 - 1904, under the leadership of William Speirs Bruce. The Expedition had an official piper, Gilbert Kerr. The idea of having Kerr play the bagpipes for the local penguins was ostensibly an experiment to see what effect the music would have on the birds. They were unimpressed. The iconic photo of Kerr, in full highland dress, playing to an Emperor penguin – which was tethered to a large pot filled with snow – was taken by Bruce in March 1904. It has become the logo for the centenary celebrations.

There's Only One Teacher in the Class!

Scottish country dancing is above all *social* dancing, so some friendly chatter on the dance floor is encouraged at socials and classes. However, please be respectful of the presiding teacher who has taken the time to prepare the class - by not talking when he or she is teaching!

Some of our members have hearing difficulties, so keeping the background noise down helps everyone to hear the teacher. All dancers want to help others, but many voices of advice can be difficult for all in the set. Please try to help others by extending a hand or pointing in the right direction, rather than speaking, to ensure that the teacher or briefer can be heard. (The teachers' committee is also looking into purchasing headset microphones, so the teacher's voice can be amplified during classes.)

If you have a question, please direct it to the teacher, rather than to your set-mates. Chances are, a couple of other sets in the room have that same question, too. We can't always answer every question during class, but feel free to approach us after class. We're more than happy to hear your suggestions and respond to your questions.

Also, please check with your <u>current</u> teacher if you feel you are ready to move up to the next class level. Thank you!

Flowers of Edinburgh – many think this refers to the Princes Street Gardens, but not necessarily so. The tune was published in England around 1750, while construction of the Gardens began in the 1770's and 1780's. In the eighteenth century, the tenements of the Old Town did not have indoor sewage disposal facilities, and the citizens emptied their chamber pots by throwing the contents out the window onto the street below. The stench was considerable. Thus, one interpretation of the meaning of the title is that it is a euphemism for these unsavoury, tasteless 'blooms'. Another interpretation is that the title refers to the young ladies of the city. Take your pick!

The dance is a reel from the RSCDS Book 1; it was originally published in 'The Ballroom'', 1827.
