Class Descriptions

Experienced Social - Mondays 7:30 - 9:30 pm, Teacher: Bob Anderson. Experienced social for dancers with a good knowledge of all common formations who wish to dance more challenging dances and formations.

Daytime Social - Tuesdays 1:15 – 3:15 pm, Teachers: Louise McGillivray and Bob Anderson. This is the class for those who prefer a daytime class. We learn/review formations, work on phrasing, covering, handing and the "teamwork" in Scottish Country dancing. We do old and new favourites, and dances from upcoming socials. A friendly group that would love to have you join them, regularly or occasionally!

Basic Class - Tuesdays 7:30 - 9:30 pm, Teacher: Sheila McCall. In the Basic class you will learn the five steps used in Scottish Country Dancing. You will learn basic formations and become familiar with the concept of sets, progression and teamwork while you experience the joy of moving to lively Scottish music. You don't need to come with a partner, just come and join us for fun evenings as you learn.

Intermediate - Wednesdays 7:30 – 9:30 pm, Teachers: Sarah Kell and Gael Forster. This class is suitable for dancers who are comfortable with basic steps and formations, reels and corner figures. We will begin the fall 2021 season gently, focusing on familiar dances and figures, and the music we love. In 2022, we hope to work up to covering new and different dances at our lively pre-pandemic pace. Build (or rebuild) your knowledge of Intermediate formations so you can dance with confidence!

Beyond Basics - Thursdays 7:30 - 9:30 pm, Teacher: Gordon Robinson. For dancers who want to move beyond basic formations and expand their repertoire, this class will teach a range of formations in a mix of traditional favourites and newer dances. For more experienced dancers, this will be an opportunity to review dance formations in a social dance setting. Dances from upcoming social programs will be included, as well as other basic and intermediate dances.

All classes will be held at the City Light Church Hall, 550 Obed Avenue *except* for the Intermediate class (Wednesday) which will be held at the Trinity Presbyterian Church Hall, 2964 Tillicum Road.

Important membership information for 2021-22

Welcome back to in-person dancing!

As our classes get underway here are some guidelines for all members.

1. Each member will be required to fill out and sign a membership application form. One payment per couple is fine but each member of a couple must sign the membership form.

2. The 2021/22 membership forms for new and returning members are available on the website <u>http://viscds.ca/membership/</u>, at the Open House (September 14 at City Light Church on Obed Avenue), or from your class rep when classes begin.

3. Membership fees (adult or youth) and class fees are due October 1, 2021. Payment may be made for the full 2021-22 year or for the first and then the second half of the year.

Payment Options:

- Cheques should be made payable to VISCDS - mail to me (Barb Currie) or deliver to an executive member. Please do not postdate cheques. I plan to be at classes in September to collect fees.

- Cash - contact and hand-deliver to an executive member (do not mail cash).

- Send eTransfers to viscds.fees@gmail.com – no security question required.

- Receipts are available on request.

Please refer to your membership form for my address and to determine your class fees per term. The membership fee is still \$30 and dance class fees for the whole year with unlimited dancing is only \$108. It's the best recreation deal in town!

4. New members who are taking advantage of the free classes in September will have their membership and class fees due October 1, 2021. New members, please give your application forms and October dues to your class rep who will give them to me.

5. Payment by class. As an alternative to prepayment of classes by full or half-year, "Drop-in" punch cards are available at \$60 each, good for 10 classes. (This is in addition to the basic \$30 membership fee.) Punch cards do not expire.

Punch cards are available from the class reps and payment for the cards is to be given to the class rep who will pass it on to the treasurer (Sue) or to me. Class reps are to ensure cards are punched as needed and members are to help remind them.

6. Keep your contact info up to date. It is sometimes necessary to contact members directly in case of cancellations and other emergencies. If your contact information changes be sure to let me (the Membership Director) know.

7. Newsletter Delivery - *The Island Fling* will be delivered electronically. If you are unable to receive an electronic newsletter, please check require a paper copy on your membership form.

<u>Proof of Covid 19 Vaccination will be required by members in the VISCDS as per the BC Public</u> <u>Health Order in effect by September 13, 2021.</u> Please bring proof of your vaccination to the first class you attend for registration. Proof of your vaccination can also be registered at the Open House at City Light Church Hall on Tuesday, September 14, 7:30 - 9:30 pm.

CLASS REPRESENTATIVES

With the start of a new year in September, there is a need for new Class Reps. Listed below are the duties that the Reps are asked to do, and since most of us are returning, these are familiar tasks.

- 1. MEMBERSHIP APPLICATIONS: Please ask people to mail membership application forms to the Membership Director or, collect forms and put them in the envelope in the class Rep box ready for pick-up (this box is kept in the cupboard on the stage). Those who wish to attend classes on a drop-in basis are still required to pay their annual fee of \$30, or youth membership (16-25) of \$20. Non-members are not eligible to attend classes as a drop-in.
- 2. PUNCH CARDS FOR DROP-INS: Please punch drop-in cards weekly. Cards will be delivered to members with their receipts. There is a supply in a marked envelope in the box, once the initial registration has happened. Please leave the cash or cheque in this same envelope when you sell a punch card. Please inform Membership Director.
- 3. COVID VACCINATION STATUS: A new duty for the Class Rep will be regarding recording COVID-19 vaccination upon the dancer's first arrival at class. The first time any dancer shows up for class, proof of vaccination will be mandatory. If a dancer has only one vaccination by the date of September 13th, we will accept that as per the Order from Public Health BC, and further that proof of double vaccination will be required by October 24th, also as per Public Health BC.
- 4. SIGN-IN RECORD: This record will have a check box for proof of vaccination. Dancers will be asked for their signature and phone number on the sign in sheet for tracking purposes in case of an outbreak. There will be a COVID symptom sheet displayed to make sure each dancer has no symptoms. The sign in sheets will be returned to the Membership Director at the end of the dancing season (December and April)
- 5. ANNOUNCEMENTS: Please announce upcoming events such as socials, any change of class venues or dates, and any other VISCDS information.
- 6. NEWSLETTERS: The *Island Fling* Newsletter will be available on the website (viscds.ca) and only members who do not have access to a computer will receive printed copies. This is requested on the application forms and their names are written on the top of the newsletter.
- 7. CLASS SPONSORED SOCIALS: Each class sponsors one social during the year, allowing the other classes to enjoy the evening without responsibilities.
- 8. VISITORS: If you see an unfamiliar face around the entrance area, please introduce yourself as a class Rep. Please make them feel welcomed and introduce them to your class teacher. Write the basic information (names, etc) on the back of the attendance sheet for future reference. Please let them know that we have 5 classes a week and that out-of-town visitors are welcome to dance without paying drop-in fees.

It would be helpful if two people shared the job as many of us are away at times and miss classes. It is an opportunity to contribute to the club and get to know your classmates better.

Teachers' Corner

As we approach a new dance season (fingers firmly crossed), I want to encourage all our dancers to turn their attention, at least a little bit, to getting ready for dancing once again. If you haven't been dancing at all, you may wish to start by rummaging around in your closet to find your ghillies. But even if you have been doing lots of exercise, it will help to do some physical and mental preparation.

In the last newsletter, I suggested several sets of exercises which can assist with some of the physical fitness for Scottish country dancing. Gradually building up with these and other exercises is a good start. To this we can add specific dance related activities.

If you are available on Thursday afternoons, you can join about 20 other dancers at Henderson Park. We are gradually moving back to dancing in actual sets with real partners. Dancing on the grass isn't the best place to tune up your footwork but it gets you moving in time with the music and other dancers. There are now a lot of "Zoom" classes recorded and available on line. All of the RSCDS weekly classes from around the world for the last 15 months are available at the <u>Dance Scottish At Home page</u>. The link to all the classes can be found about half way down the page as well as links to all the past RSCDS newsletters. The recorded classes range from simple familiar dances to some quite challenging step dances but all are by excellent teachers from around the world including people like Rebecca Blackhall-Peters from the Okanagan who will be teaching at our 2022 Workshop next April. Every class includes a good warmup and some interesting dancing. Whether you sit in your computer chair, walk around the room or do whatever steps you have space for, going through a few of these 30 minute classes will start getting your brain in gear. On the same site there are also video classes and events from virtual RSCDS Summer Schools in 2020 and 2021.

TAC Virtual Summer School 2021

Once again TAC (Teachers' Association of Canada) had to cancel the planned Summer School in Calgary. Instead, free classes were delivered over Zoom by several of the Summer School teachers. There was a wide variety of material for the classes. Ron Wallace (the devisor of Da Rain Dancin' and many other great dances) taught two classes. The first was aimed at teachers but included several good new dances which many dancers will enjoy and it won't hurt non-teachers to hear Ron's advice about being careful as we ease back into dancing. In his second session, Ron taught a class of dances with special stories.

A couple of the classes investigated the history behind some Scottish country dances. Marjorie McLaughlin's class showed how the dances collected by Thomas Wilson have changed from the early days of country dancing to the modern versions of those dances. Lara Friedman-Shedlov gave a class relating French garden parties, a Robbie Burns song and teddy bears which included some history as well as dancing. Geoffrey Selling taught a more typical class with a round the room Ceilidh dance to begin, a familiar jig with a less familiar reel both with reels of four across the dance, and finally the Westminster Reel with a reel of four on the diagonal of a 2 couple set. Alan Twhigg from Mountain View California has taught in Victoria as well as other events around the region. At Summer School he taught the Scottish Country Dances Glayva, Sands of Morar, and A Castle in the Air. He was assisted by Laura Cooper and accompanied by Susan Worland on fiddle and Michael Bentley on drums.

A nice addition to most of the classes was live music as well as whole sets to assist in demonstrating the dances. Of course it wouldn't be summer school without evening dances and a ceilidh. Of particular interest to Victoria dancers is the Musicians Concert which includes our local accordion hero, Mary Ross. For an hour of varied music I can highly recommend this concert video.

As with regular summer school, you don't need to be a teacher to attend or enjoy the videos for these events. SURVEY SAYS



Thank you to all who responded to the survey sent out to the VISCDS membership in early July. We received 81 responses out of about 120 surveys sent out to active members! Thanks for the great response! I learned quite a lot about writing a survey and the society gained valuable information quickly from the membership.

RESULTS

Some of the results were more relevant to the early summer when the survey was first sent out. For example, 45% of respondents said they would dance outdoors on a week day evening and 35% said they would dance outdoors on a weekend afternoon but in the end we did not offer these choices. An encouraging 57% said they would dance indoors after July 1 (Summer dancing at City Light Hall). Again that turned out not to be possible. Hopefully next summer!

A very encouraging 92.5% replied that they would return to dancing indoors after September 7. The teachers and executive of the club are working now to make that a reality. Again, we hope!

There was a good response to the question of registration for each of the classes in the Fall. This has given us an indication that there will be enrollment in each of the classes with the following teachers:

256some Reel

George MacDonald Fraser, author of the *Flashman* stories, also wrote a book chronicling the sojourn of the Gordon Highlanders in Libya at the end of World War II. The title story, "The General Danced at Dawn", detailed the disastrous military inspection carried out by the General of the title – until a group officers successfully danced an Eightsome Reel. (Anyone enlisting in a Highland Regiment does Scottish Country Dancing; it is part of what they do.) The General was impressed and, mellowed by several drams of *uisge beath*, doubled the set to 16, 32, 64 and finally a 128some reel, danced by the Regiment (and friends) as dawn stole over the African desert.

Ian Price, a member of the Vancouver Branch for many years – he played accordion in the Schiehallion Band – was intrigued by the story and he wondered if a 256some reel would be possible, the idea being that there would be 256 dancers in a single set. He knew that the Vancouver area was one of the few places that could muster 256 dancers, and so, aided by a computer program, he came up with a routine that would fill the criteria demanded by the Guinness Book of Records, who by this time were interested. He also enlisted the help of teachers Mary Murray, Simon Scott and the late George Will. He then had to recruit 256 dancers.

We came from all over: Vancouver and the Lower Mainland, the Sunshine Coast, Victoria (several Van Isle members took part), Nanaimo, Comox Valley, Bellingham and Seattle. We attended four rehearsals and then, on April 24, 1988, we danced the 256some Reel at the Simon Fraser University, with music by the Simon Fraser University Pipe Band, who at the time were on their way to becoming World Champions. In the end, considerably more than 256 dancers signed up. We did the dance twice through so that everyone could take part. We appeared on the CBC News and on the front page of *The Province*. And, yes, at the next printing of the *Guinness Book of Records*, there we were! It was an amazing adventure, one that I will always remember.

This record has since been superseded by a 512some and then a 1,024some reel, both organized by the late Bob Blackie and performed at the Skydome during the 1990's.

Here are the two others that I had in mind:

Set of Music - Musicians will frequently refer to a collection of tunes played together as a "set". The Oxford English Dictionary (OED) gives a couple of related definitions "a number of musical compositions forming a whole" (such as for a church service) as well as "the music adapted to... the series of movements or figures that make up a square dance or a country dance..."

Sett - "Each or any of the squares in the pattern of a tartan; the pattern itself". There is also a definition related to weaving describing the adjustment of the reeds of the loom to determine the texture of the cloth. **Gordon Robinson**
