Teachers' Corner

To preserve and further the practice of traditional Scottish country dances

The Manual of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society

the first of five objects of the Society

It would be easy to conclude from the 'rules' of dancing mentioned frequently by teachers, that we are dancing in the same way as the dancers in Scotland two centuries ago. In fact, there is considerable uncertainty about how certain dances and figures were done in the past.

The RSCDS was founded in 1923 and, in its early days, it focused on the traditional dances, publishing versions of dances which had been preserved in manuscripts or publications from 1700s and early 1800s. However, the old directions weren't always clear, and there were certainly variations in how these dances were actually danced. The society also wanted to standardize the dancing so that dancers from different areas could dance together easily.

As an example, in 2021, the RSCDS published a book of dances to honour the 250th anniversary of the birth of Sir Walter Scott. *The Heart of Mid-Lothian* draws on an old book of dances of the same name published in 1820 as well as two others from around the same time. *The Heart of Mid-Lothian* was a wildly popular novel by Scott and the dances are named for characters in the book and titles of three Scott novels. The new book contains the original directions and modern interpretations. To get a sense of the original, consider *The Laird of Dumbiedyke's Favorite* (sic):

1st and 2d Cu: 4 hands round, set and back again.

1st Cu: Lead 3 outsides opposite, back again to places

poussette & right and left

Notice that the directions don't explain outsides opposite or say who is to dance the rights and lefts. There is also uncertainty about how a poussette was to be danced and even rights and lefts. There isn't a video yet of the new version, but you can watch an earlier modern interpretation at: https://my.strathspey.org/dd/dance/3656/

The new version is quite different.

In Scottish folklore, Am Fear Liath Mòr, the Big Grey Man, the Big Grey Man of Ben MacDhui, or simply the Greyman, is the name of a presence or creature which is said to haunt the summit and passes of Ben Macdui, the highest peak of the Cairngorms.

Those who have seen it describe it as an extremely tall figure covered with short hair, or as an unseen presence that causes uneasy feelings in people who climb the mountain. Other eyewitnesses describe it as a large humanoid standing over ten feet tall and having olive toned skin with long arms and broad shoulders. Nearly all reports of Am Fear Liath Mòr include the sound of footsteps crunching in the gravel just out of sight.

In Ferla Mor the first couple dances a reel of three with first corners "as closely as convenient". There were some other dances as well.












